

## A message from our Board Chair

For the second year in a row, our Annual General Meeting has a celebratory feel. Beyond Classrooms Kingston continued its meteoric rise in 2016-17: we've grown from four to fourteen programming weeks in three years, which explains why we may be feeling equally overwhelmed and celebratory!

Thanks primarily to an Ontario Trillium Fund Grow Grant, Program Coordinator Karla Tynski became our first employee. The addition of Karla to our team in February 2016 really started the ball rolling. We added three new host sites – Bellevue House, Frontenac County Schools Museum, and the Military Communications Museum, and added ten new teachers to our expanding list of alumni. In all, a staggering 627 children and adults were engaged in Beyond Classrooms programming last year alone – most at host sites they'd never visited before.

Again thanks to Trillium, we were able to conduct a formal, arms-length program review led by Queen's Faculty of Education – Classroom Assessment group; they will be sharing their results with us this evening. I think you'll be as delighted with their results as we are.

We've faced a few challenges also, not the least of which is keeping the momentum going, post Grow Grant. Program demand - both from teachers and host sites - is now outstripping our ability to keep up. Maintaining current program fee levels is critical for our teachers, who assume fundraising duties in addition to the expanded work load a Beyond Classrooms week entails. And, in a world of shrinking resources for the cultural heritage sector, our host sites are facing increasing pressure to monetize their participation.

I'd like to acknowledge the City of Kingston for its ongoing support through the City's Heritage Fund, and through their support of Local Government Week programming. The Kingston Association of Museums, Art Galleries and Historic Sites helps us in ways too numerous to mention, and the Retired Teachers of Ontario – Eastern Ontario group purchased a video projector for us. Community sponsors Peter's Drugs, Tackaberry Heating

& Cooling, Camera Kingston, James Reid Furniture, and The Works-Kingston, all provide critical support, and are community minded businesses Kingston can be proud of. Speaking of pride, a quick read of the over 100 student quotes curated by Karla from this year's programming, however, proves that Beyond Classrooms Kingston is making a difference in the way our children see their world – powerful motivation for us all.

## A message from our Coordinator

Thanks to the Trillium Foundation funding, we had the unique opportunity to examine the potential growth and impact of the BCK program in 2016-17. Full-time support allowed us to add five programming weeks, resulting in a 51% increase in participation from students and educators. We also added three new community heritage sites, providing further opportunities for students and teachers. Thank you to the dedicated staff and volunteers at our seven host sites for helping to create engaging learning experiences for students.

With the support of our Board and Committees, we were able to develop our volunteer polices and expand our educational partnerships with Queen's University and St. Lawrence College to host placement students to assist in programming. Between BCK's own volunteers and strong parent support, over 100 volunteers contributed over a 1000 hours to support cultural enrichment in Kingston last year.

Special thanks to the team at Queen's AEG group for their expertise and dedication in helping us complete a yearlong evaluation to examine the impact of our program on teachers, students, and host site facilitators. This evaluation will give us a better sense of what the program is doing well and where it can improve in coming years.

Finally, I want to extend my appreciation to our Board and Committee members for dedicating their time to enhancing the BCK program. Ann Blake, I am forever grateful for all that you have done to support BCK and champion heritage in our community. I also want to thank Caroline Petznick, Debbie Holdich, and KAM for promoting BCK and Kingston's museums and galleries.

When I think back to the ways in which students built deeper community connections last year — whether by sharing Kingston's stories online with children across Canada, constructing monuments to Canadian soldiers to exhibit at the Military C&E Museum, hosting their own art open-house at the Agnes, or feeling empowered to create a petition to present to Council after a lively debate at City Hall — I feel proud to work for an organization that inspires students to take ownership in Kingston's heritage and culture.

## Why Beyond Classrooms?

Beyond Classrooms is a year-long program that builds inquiry learning and journal writing into a classroom environment. During the program year, teachers are able to move their classroom

into a community museum, art galleries or community site for an entire week. The site becomes an extension of the classroom where students to enhance their learning skills and knowledge of their community. Teachers integrate collaborative, inquiry-based learning while working alongside experts and the Beyond Classrooms Coordinator. Learning at a museum or gallery for a week takes away the field trip feeling and creates an environment where students slow down. They look closely and reflect through journal writing and they apply these new skills to their everyday learning.
