## A message from our Program Coordinator

What a year! The dedication of volunteers, teachers, students, sites allowed BCK to continue to grow and adapt through the challenges presented by COVID.

Programming pivoted to be delivered entirely online. More than 250 students and twelve teachers were able to experience Kingston's cultural sites and heritage collections remotely. Students learned how to sketch and journal through videos and remote workshops. They explored museums and galleries virtually, and engaged in online inquiry sessions where they had the opportunity to ask questions of community experts. Sessions were well-received by students and teachers alike who had been missing connecting with our community due to the inability to leave schools during the pandemic.

Connections were apparent despite the distance. Students found new ways to showcase their experience, with many creating digital exhibits of their own. Two classes created their own art work and digitized it. One class create their own online children's museum, while another coded their ideas for a new exhibit at City Hall. So many students said they could not wait to visit these sites in person one day.

Remote programming also provided new opportunities for BCK. With funding support from the Community Foundation and City of Kingston, BCK was able to develop programming that will increase accessibility of programming to students who may not otherwise be able to participate, such as rural students. BCK was able to increase outreach opportunities, providing activities for hundreds of students and families through March of the Museums and Heritage Fair which were delivered remotely this year.

While we eagerly await our return to sites, it is clear that BCK will continue to explore opportunities as a result of the past year. 'Virtual Visits' will be a way of reaching more students in the future and introducing more teachers to BCK programming and the rich heritage sites of our community.

Our appreciation to KAM and our host sites for their continued support of BCK. Thanks to all of our volunteers on the Board and Committees for their vital contributions. Sincere thanks to Linda Lamoureux who retired from our Board this year, we are grateful for the support you provided since BCK's inception. And special thanks to Lynn Brown whose leadership has guided BCK through the many changes of the last year, we are so grateful for all you do!


# Why Beyond Classrooms?

life-long learners and active citizens. BCK facilitates moving teachers and their students into community spaces, where authentic environments serve as a catalyst for teacher-led, student -driven, inquiry-based learning. Learning at a museum or gallery for an entire week takes away the field trip feeling and creates an environment where students slow down. They look closely and reflect through journal writing and they apply these new skills to their everyday learning. BCK strives to achieve heightened awareness of the value of cultural resources as critical components of educational and emotional development, evidenced by changed thinking on the part of its program participants.


